

2017 NH Glens Annual Report

NH Glens is a network of organizations working to increase the availability of fresh and local produce that is distributed to and through NH food pantries, soup kitchens, community suppers and schools. To do this, NH Glens harvests produce from local farms and farmers markets that would otherwise have not been harvested or sold and distributes the food to organizations that can use it. Established in 2013 with a generous gift through the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation’s You Have Our Trust fund, NH Glens employs gleaning coordinators across the state to work with farms and organizations during the growing season. Thanks to their hard work and dedication, over 469,123 pounds of fresh produce has been gleaned and distributed over the last five years to the people in New Hampshire who most need it.

Highlights

- Gleaning coordinator in Cheshire County developed an internship program for a Keene State student. This student spent 120 hours helping and learning about gleaning and hunger.

- Cheshire gleaning coordinator worked with staff from The Community Kitchen on “Health and Wellness Living Learning Collaborative: Hunger on KSC Campus.” The class included twenty four first-year students, all of whom toured The Community Kitchen and attended the coordinator’s classroom presentation on hunger issues. Eighteen of the students also visited the charitable garden at C & S Wholesale Grocers.
- Merrimack County established relationships with central kitchens who prepare food for seniors and CAP programs and increased their volunteer base by tapping church groups and students.
- The Seacoast saw an increase in donations to schools.
- The North Country coordinator worked with Nutrition Connections to prepare a dish using gleaned produce at the Community Cupboard food pantry in Lancaster. Clients eagerly took the gleaned produce home to prepare this dish.
